Science Workshops Spark Curiosity Across the School

Last week, pupils in Years 2, 3, and 5 were thrilled to take part in an exciting series of science workshops, led by a visiting scientist. The workshops were packed with engaging, hands-on activities designed to inspire curiosity and bring scientific concepts to life. Children participated eagerly, with experiments and demonstrations that tied in with their current learning and the National Curriculum.









Michelle from Year 2 described her excitement: "I really enjoyed the science workshop, especially the experiment where the water erupted from the bottle." This activity highlighted the principles of pressure and reactions—key components of the science curriculum. Seb, also from Year 2, found the demonstration of shrinking plastic particularly fascinating: "I liked it when the man heated up some plastic in the oven and they shrank into balls." His observation connected with the study of materials and their properties.

Older pupils, were also suitably engaged, Max, from Year 3, shared: "My favourite part was the shadow experiment involving puppets. I learned that when the light source was closer to the puppet, the smaller the shadow." This activity demonstrated the interplay between light sources, shadows, and their size, which ties into the curriculum's focus on light and its effects.

Also in Year 3, Ava enjoyed the "washing line experiment," where teamwork and problem-solving were key. She noted how the scientist challenged their thinking but celebrated that they "were able to work out what was happening." Erin marvelled at the rainbow effects created by light passing through water: "The machine projected a light onto the ceiling with the colours of the rainbow." This demonstration illustrated the science behind light refraction and colour formation.

The workshops also included experiments that explored density, smoke rings and even changing the colour of water, all of which reinforced important scientific principles like states of matter, forces and mixtures. Minnie particularly enjoyed experimenting with bouncy balls, while others tackled challenges like separating coloured water back to its original state—a tricky yet rewarding task.

These workshops were more than just fun—they provided valuable opportunities for children to apply and extend their scientific understanding in a real-world context. Thank you to all the parents whose generous donations made these events possible. Your support helps us bring science to life in exciting ways, encouraging our young learners to think critically and discover the wonders of the world around them.
