

Attendance, Absence and Punctuality

Good attendance and punctuality are crucial to ensuring children have the best chance to succeed in their education. This week, we issued letters to parents of children with attendance below 90% or who are persistently late, raising concerns about their attendance. I want to reassure you that these letters are intended as reminders rather than criticisms. I fully understand that some absences are unavoidable due to illness. As a school, we are committed to working with families to improve attendance, not against them.

A reminder: 10 sessions of unauthorised absence may lead to a fixed penalty notice issued by the Local Authority (LA). Families of children with unauthorised absences have also been sent reminder letters.

On punctuality, school opens at 8:40am, with learning starting immediately. Children arriving after 9:10am will receive an unauthorised absence mark for the morning, as stipulated by the LA.



Our Community, Our Voice: Making a Difference Where It Matters

This week, we highlight two important issues impacting our community. The second is a petition advocating for a reduced speed limit on Rochdale Road to enhance safety for pedestrians, particularly children and families.

Say No to Waste Incineration in Sowerby Bridge

The proposed waste incinerator in Sowerby Bridge has raised significant concerns about its environmental and health impacts, including:

- Its location in the valley, which could intensify pollution effects.
- A short flume, potentially leading to poor emission dispersion.
- Proven flood risks in the area.
- Low-quality technology and inadequate oversight of emissions.

A community rally will take place on **Saturday**, **February 1st**, **at 11:00 AM**, starting at the Moorings car park in Sowerby Bridge. This event aims to demonstrate opposition to the project and advocate for responsible decision-making that prioritizes public health and environmental safety.

Making Rochdale Road Safer for Our Children

Rochdale Road is a busy route for many families, with children walking to school and parents commuting. Currently, the speed limit is 30mph, which raises safety concerns, especially during school drop-off and pick-up times. A lower speed limit of 20mph could significantly reduce risks and make the road safer for everyone. A petition supporting this change is available for signing at the local post office. In the coming weeks, some of our classes will also be writing to our local MP to advocate for this change.
